Welcome Assistant Professor Joeva Rock, a development anthropologist whose research focuses on the interplay of agriculture, politics, and development. Prior to joining us at SBU, she was assistant professor in Development Studies at the University of Cambridge;





she has also taught in the Global Poverty and Practice program at the University of California-Berkeley, and was a postdoctoral fellow in the Department of Nutrition and Food Studies at NYU and the Department of International Studies at Dalhousie University.

Joeva's book, *We Are Not Starving: The Struggle for Food Sovereignty in Ghana* reveals how global and local political forces both shape food production in contemporary Africa. She will be teaching courses on topics including development anthropology, medical anthropology, and food. We are honored to have Joeva join our faculty!

As part of COP-16 she will be a panelist at the event, "From Policy to Practice: The Role of Field Station Networks in Implementing Science-Based, Inclusive Conservation." In October, a documentary titled "Ivohiboro, the Forgotten Forest" was released and broadcast in France. It will premiere in the USA and be shown on PBS in 2025 (late spring or summer).

This film will highlight an almost intact tropical forest located in the southeast of Madagascar. This recently discovered protected area is home to exceptional biodiversity in an arid and isolated region.
