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ATTICA RALLY - Over 40 supporters of the former Attica Brothers now on trial held a sit-in in the office of Student Affairs to deponstrate the urgent need for a broader public understanding of the implic implications and relevance of Attica, 1971 and America, 1974.

Attica, 1971 was the anguish voice of oppressed peoples demanding pertinent changes in a corrupt and unjust system, a system already exposed by the nation's highest executive officeholder. The atrocious assault that claimed 43 lives and over 200 wounded was a clear violation of international law and the treaties of nations. (Geneva Convention) Even a member of the Mational Guard testified at the McKay Commission hearings that he was a eyewitness to blatant atrocities by state police and prison guards committed against defenseless, naked, wounded inmates immediately following the retake of the prison.

And today in America 1974, 57 inmates, mostly Black, who fired not a single dun-dum bullet are accused of the crime of demanding to by treated with the dignity of a man. They have received not a dime fr from the state for the defense costs, yet over \$6 million has been allocated to prosecute them. Should not the public, the people care and even demand that justice, such an exclusive novelty in American jurisprudence, at least for one time be rendered in truth? The are the real criminals?
