Our guest speaker will be Zebulon Miletsky, Africana Studies

<u>BIO</u>:

Dr. Miletsky is an Associate Professor of Africana Studies at Stony Brook and received his PhD in African American Studies (with a concentration in History) at the W.E.B. Du Bois Department of

Afro-American Studies at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst in 2008. There, he was trained as a historian by some of the best thinkers in the field of African American Studies, many of whom are veterans of the Civil Rights and Black Power movements of the 1960s, 70s and beyond. Miletsky was awarded a "Game Changer Award" from the Long Island Area NAACP branches "for his work in Civil Rights in Long Island." He lives in Brooklyn.

<u>TOPIC</u>: Rethinking School Desegregation in Boston

Dr. Zebulon Miletsky will discuss the process of writing and researching his new book *Before Busing* which tells the story of the men and women whose struggle to make school desegregation a reality in Boston was written out of the narrative and ignored by books like J. Anthony Lukas' Pulitzer Prize-winning book *Common Ground*. This informal talk will provide a clearer picture of the long and hard-fought campaigns to break the back of Jim Crow education in the North and make Boston into a better, more democratic city.

IN MEMORIAM:

William Dawes, Department of Economics

Bill was a faculty member in the Department of Economics from 1969 until his retirement in 2016, then held a John S. Toll Professorship for three years. Last fall, Bill came back to the classroom one last time to participate in the Department's Teaching Practicum ECO 698, which he taught for

decades. He taught Introduction to Economics, ECO 108 for more than 40 years (Javits 100 was his backyard), and generations of students remember him dearly. In fact, some of his former students established the William Dawes Fund for Excellence in November of 2010, the proceeds of which are now used to give the Department's yearly awards to graduate students in recognition of their teaching and research excellence.

From 1999-2010, Bill served as chair or co-chair of the Department of Economics, and served as undergraduate program director for several years until the Fall of 2015.

Bill was a mentor and friend to many, and his dedication to undergraduate education was inspirational. His love for Stony Brook and its students is a legacy that will always be part of the Department of Economics and its mission.

Abraham Der Krikorian, Department of Biochemistry

Abraham D. Krikorian of Belle Terre, New York passed away unexpectedly on May 21st, 2023. He was Professor Emeritus of Biochemistry and Cell Biology at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Abraham was a kind and loving soul who expressed his opinions and feelings very directly, but with civility and was greatly respected. He was the youngest of six exceedingly close children (3 girls and 3 boys) with older sisters Alice, Anna and Mary still with us. Brothers Charlie and Peter are deceased.

Abe's colleagues would describe him as industrious and energetic. He maintained a large laboratory and enjoyed consistent funding largely through NASA, and together with Thora Halstead was a prime mover in 1984 in the establishment of the American Society for Gravitational and Space Biology (ASGSB) - name now modified to Research rather than Biology, ASGSR.

Abe had a distinguished scientific career covering a diverse range of topics and subjects. He participated with his Ph.D. mentor from Cornell, F.C. Steward, in the 1975 joint Soviet-USA Biological Satellite Cosmos 782 mission by flying totipotent cells of carrot capable of developing into full grown somatic embryos. This was 'a first,' and over the years was followed by many experiments with aseptically cultured higher plants and plantlets in space.

Abe received numerous awards and held offices in various Societies. He specialized in cell and tissue culture for cloning purposes and was able to integrate that aspect of the research into spaceflight experiments and in the cultivation of various tropical plantation crops like banana, plantain, African oil palm, rubber etc. Daylily and its hybrids were also studied in-depth and served as "a subject" for research in space at low grav.

Charles Wurster (1930-2023), SOMAS

Charlie Wurster was that rare academic who made an impact on the world beyond the walls of the academy. As early as 1962, while teaching at Dartmouth, he noted and began to worry about the effects of DDT – that miracle pesticide – on bird and animal life (and later, on humans). When Wurster came to Stony Brook to join the biology department in 1965 he soon made an alliance with Victor Yannacone, a lawyer in Patchogue, and they moved to the use of injunctions and lawsuits, plus a good deal of lobbying, to block such activities as spraying local ponds with DDT. Within a few years they organized the Environmental Defense Fund – the EDF, now with 3 million members and an annual income of \$300 million. Quoting Elena Conis, a historian at Berkeley, Wurster was a major

groundbreaker in that he knew the path to follow was one of "putting health at the core" of environmental work. He retired from Stony Brook in 1995 but left an enduring legacy. (A full obituary appeared in the Washington Post, July 25).

Eric Lampard, (1922 – 2023) Department of History

Eric E. Lampard was a senior historian of major repute when he came to Stony Brook from Wisconsin in 1970, part of the History Department's pushed to support its growing status as part of a research University.

Lampard was from Southampton, England. He went to the London School of Economics (LSE), though his undergraduate career was interrupted by four years in the Royal Marines that included combat in southeast Asia. He pursued his graduate work at Wisconsin and then, after some years at Smith College and then at Wisconsin, he came to Stony Brook. Lampard's areas of expertise were (soft) economic history and the process of urbanization. An early study of the dairy industry in Wisconsin has remained a classic and, even after retirement - imposed by the old mandatory retirement rule – he continued to be an oft-consulted guru in his field. A number of his graduate students attended his 100th birthday and testified to his sharp wit until the very end.
