Students Respond to County's Proposed Bus Cuts

More than 100 students responded to surveys from the <u>Graduate Student Organization</u> and <u>Office of</u> <u>Commuter Student Services and Off Campus</u> <u>Living</u> regarding a <u>Suffolk County</u> proposal to cut bus service in an effort to close a budget gap. In addition, others joined Judith Greiman, Chief Deputy to the President and Vice President for Government and Community Relations, at a public hearing to verbally voice their opposition.

In particular, elimination of the S71 route, which serves the main campus and Stony Brook University Hospital, is frequented by students, employees, hospital patients and visitors with destinations southeast of the University. At the hearing, Ms. Greiman provided a summary of comments from the student survey. Among the survey results, 84% of students said they use the route daily to several times a month and 45% use the route to travel to and from school.

The County is expected to implement the cuts in early October. Students and employees affected by the elimination of S71 can meet with a Suffolk County transit representative on October 5 in Room 303 of the <u>Students Activities Center</u> where they can map out an alternative route. Riders can also visit <u>Suffolk</u> <u>Transit</u> and click on the <u>511 link</u> for transit assistance. Keep in mind that the Suffolk County transit website will continue to show the S71 route until it is officially out of service. Riders can also call Suffolk Transit at 631-852-5200 to speak with a representative.

According to <u>SUNY's policy on Political Campaign Activity at SUNY Campuses</u>, the following should be kept in mind for SUNY employees' political activity:

State employees must not use their position to gain political favor, encourage or discourage political

contribution or activity or interfere with an election or lawful political activity. State employees may not use State resources (including SUNY letterhead, computers, e-mail and telephones) for partisan political purposes, but have the right to make personal political contributions, and to be active in personal political campaigns during nonworking hours.

Congress Clears Bill to Prevent Shutdown

Congress hit the exits Wednesday night, with the <u>House and Senate passing legislation</u> to avoid a government shutdown and lawmakers skipping town until after Election Day.

The bill, which has White House backing, would fund the federal government through Dec. 9, provide \$1.1 billion to combat the Zika virus and send \$500 million to Louisiana and other states facing natural disasters. The package is expected to land on the president's desk in short order and lawmakers will cast their next roll calls in Washington during the lame-duck session in mid-November.

<u>Stony Brook University's Office of Government Relations</u> along with our fellow colleagues at AAU continue to urge Congress to complete the FY17 appropriations process before the end of December and to give high priority to research and higher education funding.

SBU Students on Capitol Hill
