## Fernando Loffredo Awarded a Five-Year Max-Planck Partner Group Grant

Assistant Professor Fernando Loffredo was awarded a five-year grant by the German Max-Planck Society, one of the world's most prestigious research institutes. As Principal Investigator, Professor Loffredo will lead a collaborative project titled "Empires, Environments, Objects: Connecting Visual and Material Cultures across the Hispanic World" in partnership with the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú, Lima, and the Kunsthistorisches Institut in Florence– Max-Planck Institute for Art History, Italy.



This project, sponsored by a Max-Planck Partner Group Grant, seeks to explore the web of connections among the visual and material cultures and its transformative power in diverse communities of people and environments across the global territories under Spanish and Portuguese rule, with a particular focus on early modern Latin America and the so-called Spanish Pacific. Beginning in 2022 and continuing through 2027, this grant will offer new opportunities to Stony Brook students and faculty, and will bring innovative scholarship and academic activities to our campus.

## Digital Humanities and Mestizo Studies

In conjunction with Professor Paul Firbas's new course on Mestizo Studies, Dr. Isabella Magni of the University of Sheffield (UK), and Rutgers University doctoral candidate Paolo Scartoni visited Stony Brook on April 7, 2022 to give a talk and participate in a conversation with students on digital tools and methods in digital humanities.

The event was structured around a series of basic questions such as, "What are the digital humanities?" "How is the digital changing the way we read and interpret literary and historical texts?" "What do we mean when we talk about digital projects?"



#### Sir Run Run Shaw Series Lecture

As part of Professor Javier Uriarte's course on "Literature and Politics in Nineteenth-Century Latin America," Felipe Martínez-Pinzón, Associate Professor in the Department of Hispanic Studies at Brown University, delivered one of the Fall 2022 semester's <u>Sir Run Run Shaw Series</u> lectures, sponsored by the Dean of the College of Arts and Science. Professor Martínez-Pinzón spoke on "Sketches of Manners, Civil War and Liberal Reform in Nineteenth-Century Latin America," a topic related to Martínez's recent book Patricios en Contienda: Cuadros de costumbres, reformas liberals y representación del pueblo en Hispanoamérica (1830-1880) (University of North Carolina Press, 2021).

## Edward Guiliano '78 Global Fellowship Program

María Medín-Doce was awarded a Guiliano Global Fellowship to undertake research in the the Biblioteca Nacional de España in Madrid, in their collection of magazines and periodicals directed toward women readers during the period of the Civil War and Franco dictatorship. This research is in support of Maria's dissertation on the physical space of the house and the idea of home as an emotional and moral concept.

Samuel Espíndola Hernández received funding from the Guiliano Global Fellowship Program for research at the James Baldwin Library in MacDowell, New Hampshire as part of a project titled "Transcribing Silences: Notes on Carlos Soto-Román and documentary poetry." Soto-Román began work on a series of poems in response to the military coup and Pinochet dictatorship.







#### Max Planck Institute Fellowship

Jose Gabriel Alegría held a two month fellowship at the Max Planck Institute in Florence, Italy, pursuing research on the "Numens Triceps," or Three-Faced Trinity, an iconography that that enjoyed a wide diffusion in Renaissance Europe as well as the colonial Andes and continues to influence forms of modern Andean religious expression.
