Following is an explanation of file names used in this study.

Each file name can be broken down in different parts, as shown below:

(1): Recording session number

Since our participants were recorded 3 (or 5) times over the course of two years, the number in this part indicates which recording session the data are from (e.g., CB1 is the first recording for this subject t, CB3 is the third recording, etc.)

(2): Time point recording was made

Indicates which semester the recording was made; e.g., Fall 2015, Spring 2016, etc. This information is needed to select the materials that match the recording since later recording sessions sometimes included additional words or tasks.

(3): Participant number

Normally, users of our data will be searching for specific subject numbers, based on their interest in, e.g., higher or lower proficiency speakers.

(4): Type of experiment

For example, focus dialogue, wordlist, etc.
