Class Logistics:

Each student will make a single presentation and participate in the discussions for the other student's presentations. Each presentation will be ~15–20 minutes long after which the class will discuss the subject together as a group, including answering any questions posed from the class.

Note: students will be assigned a presentation date randomly—if necessary they can swap with one of their classmates, but must alert the instructor two weeks in advance of the original presentation date. The schedule of talks will be posted on blackboard after the first class meeting.

Presenter's responsibilities:

- Each student will pick a topic based on a *recent discovery or article in astronomy*. All students should choose their topics by the *Topic Discussion* class. In this class, we will briefly discuss the topics and what interesting aspects we want to hear about.

Having your topic chosen and being prepared to briefly describe it on the Topic Discussion class is part of your grade.

- Student will either bring their laptop to class to present or email the Professor a PDF (*not Powerpoint!*) of their slides they day before the class presentation.
- Student will lead the discussion on that topic by preparing a 15–20 minute presentation on the subject.

If the student is not prepared or the presentation is inadequate, the student will not get credit for the presentation portion of the class.

Our presentation schedule is full, so there is no room for make-ups if you forget to do your presentation.

- Student and instructor will field questions about the topic from the class
- A short video (< 1 min.) can be part of the presentation, but you should not rely on video narration to do your presentation—you are to present the topic in your own words.

Non-presenter's responsibilities:

For those weeks you are not presenting you will do the following:

- The student will attend both presentations each week—attendance will be taken. You need to sign the in-class attendance sheet to get attendance/participation credit.
- The student will provide an evaluation of the presenter's talk, giving feedback on the presentation style, content and, what you learned.

Course Grade:

The following weighting will be used:

- presentation: 70%
- having topic ready to discuss on Topic Discussion day: 10%
- attendance and feedback submissions: 20%

Letter grades will be based on a standard grade scale (i.e. 93–100 is an 'A', 90–92 is an 'A–', 87–89 is a 'B+', ...)

Students who wish to discuss their grades or class performance should meet with the instructor one-on-one via zoom. *For privacy reasons, grades will not be discussed via e-mail.*
