All J-1 applicants are required by the U.S. government to document an assessment of English language proficiency. Below are guidelines for prospective scholars and departments to use when submitting evidence of English language proficiency in accessVIS.

Interview with Sponsor or English Language Professor/Faculty

Applicants without a recognized English language test or diploma from an English speaking country may submit a letter certifying their English proficiency. The letter must be on **university letterhead** and **signed by the interviewer**. The letter can come from one of two sources:

- 1. A faculty or professor of English in the Foreign Language Department of an academic institution, or
- 2. Stony Brook University's sponsoring department, after conducting and documenting an interview either in-person or by videoconferencing. If videoconferencing is unavailable, a telephone interview is acceptable. A template letter is available at stonybrook.edu/visa/forms. The template may be modified as necessary.

Potential J-1 scholars must upload the letter in accessVIS.
