This fall, the Wang Center is leveraging all its cultural resources to provide broad-ranging programs that will give our visitors the opportunity to explore Asia without ever leaving Long Island.

Our programs offer you the opportunity to traverse great distances and leap across time as you experience places from ancient China to medieval Japan to contemporary Singapore. Learn, for example, through the **Origami Heaven** exhibition and accompanying workshops and lectures that the Japanese art of origami is no longer considered to be only a children's craft, but in fact influences science, mathematics and high fashion. Commemorate the end of World War II and mark the 50th anniversary of Singapore's Independence through our exhibition, **Reality Override: Mixed Media Works by Ren Zi** and a performance by **Verena Tay**.

Broadening and deepening our Asian cultural journey this fall, the Charles B. Wang Center is providing a one-of-a-kind people's exhibition entitled **Explore History: Objects from Asia** that gives you, our community, the opportunity to exhibit family stories and artifacts. Included among these objects will be a grandmother's Masala brick from India, tiger balm from Singapore and a Japanese beer poster made in the 1930s. We will also explore Asian culinary history through chopsticks, celebrate Halloween by presenting stories of tricksters from Southeast Asia, and during the time of traditional harvest festivals, our center will resonate with the harmonized rhythms of the **Beat to the Moon** drum festival.

Korean American artist Sook Jin Jo is a multidisciplinary artist who uses found materials such as wood from discarded furniture that resonates with its previous history. Her interconnected themes include — space and form, destruction and rebirth, the material and the spiritual as well as life and death. Inspired by a recent artist's residency in Shanghai, Jo's new series of black paintings explores the iconographies of clouds from traditional Chinese painting by contemplating the current air pollution and the complexity of the metropolis.

In celebration of Singapore's 50th anniversary of Independence, the Charles B. Wang Center highlights a multitude of Singaporean cultural themes with the artist **Ren Zi**. Ren Zi is a self-taught digital media artist who uses nature, his personal memories and Singapore's transformation as inspiration for his art. Ren Zi investigates the malleability of memory and our internal reality by citing phenomenological psychology and Buddhist and Taoist philosophies. Ren Zi prints on a wide range of materials including acrylic, aluminum and bamboo paper. This is Ren Zi's first exhibition in the United States and the result of his six-month artist residency at Nars Foundation in Brooklyn. Ren Zi has exhibited in Singapore at Ion Art Gallery, Instinc Gallery and Volvo Art Loft.

In this performance Ms. Borderies and Mr. Barthod present *Two Tales: Xieng Mieng Stories*, a shadow play in which the popular Lao character Xieng Mieng uses his quick wits and his sly sense of humor to challenge the king, and *The Adventures of Sang Kancil the Mouse-Deer*, a Malaysian tale featuring a popular character who uses cleverness and intelligence to triumph over big, mean-spirited animals.

The Masau-no Kai Kyogen Company was founded by Mansaku Nomura II, a Living National Treasure of Japan, and is now also led by his son, Mansai II, part of a 250 year-old theatrical family line. Kyogen is a medieval popular comedy founded in the early 14th century in Kyoto and which became integrated into the middle of each Noh play. Mansaku has been a pioneer in sharing Kyogen, as both a traditional and contemporary art, with audiences around the world.

CONTEMPORARY ART PRACTICE FROM A TRANS-ASIAN PERSPECTIVE

Ren Zi is a contemporary artist of Singapore. He studied psychology and worked as a commercial writer before he devoted himself full-time to the arts. Figurative characters in his fantastic drawings are created in digital mediums and then printed on various media such as acrylic, aluminium and bamboo paper. Ren Zi is a product of Singapore, exposed to its multi-ethnic geo-political environment as well as global currents in high art and pop culture. Professor Kyunghee Pyun will open a dialogue with this quirky artist who is also partly otaku, partly science geek, and partly utopian dreamer.

MODULAR KIRIGAMI

Related to *origami* (paper folding) is *kirigami* (paper cutting) and just as modular origami involves assembling many identical pieces of folded paper, so modular kirigami involves assembling many identical pieces of cut paper to make a beautiful symmetric structure. This talk will be a highly visual introduction to the techniques of modular kirigami and some of the mathematical ideas that underlie it.

THE KILLING FIELDS OF DR. HAING S. NGOR

PORT JEFFERSON DOCUMENTARY FILM SERIES

Set against the backdrop of Cambodia's Khmer Rouge reign of terror, *The Killing Fields of Dr. Haing S. Ngor* chronicles a powerful journey of love, loss and reconciliation. The years encapsulating this horrific period are seen through the eyes of Dr. Haing S. Ngor, who escaped to America and recreated his experiences in *The Killing Fields*, winning an Oscar® for his first film. From 1975 to 1979, the Khmer Rouge's social experiment transformed the country into a communist agricultural utopia, causing the deaths of some two million Cambodians who perished from mass starvation, forced labor, torture, slavery, ethnic cleansing and political executions. Dr. Ngor became the de facto worldwide ambassador for truth and justice in his homeland, only to be gunned down in an alley in Chinatown Los Angeles – a case still surrounded by transnational conspiracy theories.

LOVE MARRIAGE

Port Jefferson Documentary Film Series

Love Marriage In Kabul is a fascinating and moving story following romance, courtship and marriage practices in Afghanistan. The film won the Audience Award for best documentary at the 2014 Sydney Film Festival. Love Marriage in Kabul details Mahboba's untangling of a seemingly forbidden love between Abdul, an orphaned boy, and Fatemeh, the girl next door. The documentary is driven with suspense as the characters plot and journey tirelessly to unite Abdul and Fatemeh. This is a film which transcends its genre. It is not a mere recounting of events, nor is it a dramatisation. Rather, the filmmakers have cracked the surface of the story, allowing audiences to be compelled and engrossed in the human drama. In addition, an unexpected pivot escalates tension to a feverish pitch, and the documentary becomes gripping reality.

PEOPLE IN THE SKY JOURNEY TO NORTH KOREA

Introduction & Q&A by film's producer, Dai Sil Kim-Gibson

People Are the Sky, Kim-Gibson's eighth, and most personal film, connects two ideas: the search for home, and the nature of ordinary people, while exploring the evolution of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) in relation to the Republic of Korea (ROK) and the USA. The film's title was inspired by Dong Hak, or Eastern Learning, the indigenous Korean religion / philosophy that arose in the late 19th century. Dong Hak teaches that God is Ha Nu Nim – he who resides in the sky – and that all people are equal with God: a teaching that elevates common people and gives rise to the saying "People Are the Sky."

COMRADE KIM GOES FLYING

Introduction and Q&A by Producer/Director Nicholas Bonner

Comrade Kim Goes Flying is a 2012 joint British-Belgian-North Korean romantic comedy set and filmed in Pyongyang, North Korea. The film's star Han Jong-sim, an actual aerialist who took acting lessons especially for this role, plays a young woman named Kim Yong Mi, who is sent from her small mining town to Pyongyang to work at a construction site. She then pursues her dream of becoming a circus trapeze artist despite her family and her community's disapproval.
